INDEPENDENT SPENDING EXCEEDS \$1.25 MILLION IN CITY COUNCIL RACES

Independent spending has surpassed \$1.25 million in the races for the seven City Council seats that will appear on the March 8 ballot. Nearly \$1.1 million has been spent in the Council District 8 race.

In District 8, nearly \$83,000 has been spent to support and over \$209,000 to oppose incumbent Bernard Parks. Over \$770,000 has been spent to support and \$20,000 to oppose one challenger, Forescee Hogan-Rowles, while \$11,550 has been spent to oppose a second challenger, Jabari Jumaane.

Most of the independent spending in the Council District 8 race has been done by four groups: Working Californians to Support Forescee Hogan-Rowles for City Council 2011; the Los Angeles Police Protective League PAC; and the Los Angeles County Federation of Labor AFL-CIO and its sponsored committee, the Alliance to Support Forescee Hogan-Rowles for City Council 2011. Together, these entities have spent \$992,843 to support Forescee Hogan-Rowles and oppose Bernard Parks and Jabari Jumaane.

In the other six Council District races, approximately \$159,000 has been spent independently. Most of that independent spending has occurred in the race for Council District 14, in which nearly \$89,000 has been spent to support incumbent Jose Huizar and more than \$27,000 has been spent to support challenger Rudy Martinez.

Independent expenditures are expenditures of \$1,000 or more that are made to support or oppose candidates or ballot measures and are not coordinated with a candidate or a candidate-controlled committee. There is no limit to the amount that may be spent independently. Los Angeles City Charter § 803(s)(1) requires independent expenditures to be reported within 24 hours of being made. For this reason, independent expenditure numbers may change and are updated on the Commission's website daily.
